District Deputy Report

Knights at the Start of the 20th Century

The Knights of Columbus grew dramatically in response to the needs of communities within the United States but well beyond. By 1910, councils had been chartered throughout the United States and Canada, and international expansion continued into Mexico, the Philippines, Cuba and Panama.

During this early period, the Knights also turned to college campuses. In 1904 Knights and their families attended ceremonies at the Catholic University of America in Washington D.C., in which the Order presented the school with a grant to establish a K of C chair of American history. Chartered in 1910, Notre Dame Council 1477 was the Order's first college council, launching college councils that today include 244 schools worldwide.

1900: The first exemplification of the Fourth Degree takes place on Feb. 22, 1900, in New York City where 1,100 Knights receive the degree. The following May, another 750 Knights take the degree in Boston.

1904: More than 10,000 Knights and their families attend ceremonies at the Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C., in which a check for \$55,633.79 is presented to the school for the establishment of a KofC chair of American history. From 1909 to 1913, Knights raise \$500,000 to establish a permanent endowment for CUA.

1905: The first council in the Philippines — Manila Council 1000 — is chartered after the Spanish-American War. The same year, the Order expanded to Mexico, establishing Guada-lupe Council 1050 in Mexico City.

1906: The Knights of Columbus moves to a new headquarters in New Haven, right by the New Haven green.

1909: U.S. workers in the Canal Zone start Balboa Council 1371 in Panama City and San Agustin Council 1390 is instituted in Havana, Cuba.

1909: A reported 5,000 Knights meet James A. Flaherty's train in Philadelphia in 1909 when he arrives at the annual convention where he is elected Supreme Knight.

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District Deputy Report Cont.

As membership in the Knights of Columbus grew, the Order became known as a force for public good. Following the dedication ceremony for the Christopher Columbus Memorial Fountain in Washington, D.C., in 1912, a reporter for The Washington Star noted the large number

of Knights in attendance "marked anew the important position of the Knights of Columbus as an order in the social fabric of the United States."

During World War I, the Order provided rest and recreational facilities and social services to Allied servicemen of all faiths. K of C Huts throughout the United States and Europe provided religious services, supplies and recreation under the motto, "Everybody Welcome, Everything Free."

Everybody meant everybody. Whatever your race or creed, you were welcome at K of C facilities. In fact, the Order was praised by a contemporary African American historian of World War I, because "unlike the other social welfare organizations operating in the war, it never drew the color line."


As a result of the Order's wartime work, which earned high praise from Pope Benedict XV, nearly 400,000 men joined the Knights between 1917 and 1923.

1914: Tens of thousands of copies of a "bogus oath" are circulated to defame the Knights of Columbus. The Knights, in turn, lay the groundwork for a lecture series and educational programs to combat anti-Catholic hostility. Between 1914 and 1917, the number of anti-Catholic publications drops from 60 to fewer than five.

1917: When the United States enters World War I, Supreme Knight Flaherty writes President Woodrow Wilson telling him that the Order plans to establish centers to provide for the troops' "recreational and spiritual comfort." The Knights' services, he says, will be offered "regardless of creed."

By the summer of 1917, the Order opens service centers, or "K of C Huts," in training camps and behind the lines of battle. The Knights and independent fund drives raise nearly \$30 million to finance the huts.

Pickup and Drop-Off

Brother Knights,

December has been fruitful in the way that all of our PICKUPANDROPOFF programs are running with awesome workers. We will miss Mike Wachter, who died in November and his new life with the Lord was celebrated by us and Knights at St. Paul's and 939 where he had been Grand Knight. He was our driver at Starbucks and Chic-fil-A. He was replaced by Ted Halek, Ron Swanson and Ken Kirshner.

Last Christmas we started working with Backpack Beginnings, delivering lunches to two schools for the students to take home on weekends.

This year we have four schools with a total of 155 lunches per week. Our drivers are Ted Halek, Mark Harris, Greg Williams and Dan Lyons.

Our total work in PICKUPANDROPOFF IS 19 drivers doing 28 pickups a week in about 42 hours. I am so pleased with this group. Most of the food goes to our favorite local charity, Room at the Inn, with one delivery made to Sanctuary House and the four Backpack Beginning schools. I get to take the place of one or two of these each week and clean up loose ends. I have yet to hear of a bean counter wondering what we could do if we got paid. We do get paid. In Matthew 25 you will see that every time we feed the hungry we do it for the Lord.

We are reminded that in spite of Roe v. Wade's overturn there is plenty to do. N.C. reduced the time of aborting babies from 20 to 12 weeks. These reductions all over the country have amounted to 38,000 more babies being born nationwide. Indiana and Kentucky have reduced their abortions to zero. If we are going to make abortion a thing of the past N.C. will have to go the same way. There is a Right to Life march in DC on January 12. Please watch it on EWTN to see what is happening nationally. As I find out about other events I will tell you.

January Right to Life Month



On January 22, 1973, the Supreme Court legalized abortion throughout the United States in its companion decisions *Roe v. Wade* and *Doe v. Bolton*. Since that time, millions of children have lost their lives, and millions of women and families have been wounded by abortion.

On June 24, 2022, the *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization* decision overturned *Roe v. Wade*, and we praise God for the great opportunity state and federal legislators now have to protect pre-born children. While God, in His mercy, ended the nearly fifty-year nationwide regime of

abortion on demand, right now state and federal laws, in many instances, are still hostile to pre-born children. So, great prayer and advocacy is very needed.

The General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM), no. 373, designates January 22 as a particular day of prayer and penance, called the "Day of Prayer for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children":

In all the Dioceses of the United States of America, January 22 (or January 23, when January 22 falls on a Sunday) shall be observed as a particular day of prayer for the full restoration of the legal guarantee of the right to life and of penance for violations to the dignity of the human person committed through acts of abortion. The liturgical celebrations for this day may be the "Mass For Giving Thanks to God for the Gift of Human Life" (no. 48/1 of the Masses and Prayers for Various Needs and Occasions), celebrated with white vestments, or the Mass "For the Preservation of Peace and Justice" (no. 30 of the Masses and Prayers for Various Needs and Occasions), celebrated.


